

Rica Trujillo: Sheep Farmer and Cheesemaker

Many of you know Rica as Ginger's and Jazz's owner but you may not know that she recently expanded her animal to include horned Icelandic sheep. She started with 4 ewes in August ranging in age from 5 months to 8 years. After retiring in September, Rica got serious in October, bought a ram for her flock and put him to work in November. She's pretty sure he was good at his job and all 4 ewes are pregnant!

When the grass was growing, the daily routine was pretty simple since they were out on grass. Rica would clean the barn and change their water bucket daily. Every 5-6 days she would move the electric netting to rotate their pasture so they would have fresh grass to eat. A big concern with sheep is the barber pole parasite. Since Iceland doesn't have barber pole, the sheep lack any natural resistance, making the rotating of pasture key when they live on grass. Now that it's winter they live on a "dry lot" - no grass for them to eat so they get hay twice a day. They really look forward to their hay!

Icelandic sheep have really long fleece, which is preferred by hand spinners. Rica sheered them in early October after practicing on Jazz. "Let's just say that Jazz looked a lot better than the sheep after I was done with them!" Rica said after clipping. They will need to be sheered again in March before they lamb and Rica is thinking about

hiring someone to do it since they will be fully pregnant at that time. The lambs should be born in mid-April.



Rica bought the goats to further her interest in making cheese. She hopes to make feta and pecorino which are traditional sheep cheeses. Sheep don't give as much milk as goats so she won't have much milk to practice with as she hones her cheesemaking skills. Among the cheese makers Rica has met, there are few who make cheese from sheep's milk, primarily because there is so little. However, the cheese community is very excited to have her among their number and can't wait to see how she does!

We're pretty excited about Rica's project as well and will keep you posted on her progress!

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
